and eight years is about half of a cat's natural lifetime.






Well, some of these guys are pretty rich to begin with, so they use some of their own money. But most of them get donations from people or groups that really want to see them get elected.

WHAT IS VOTE REGISTRATION



Voter registration is a process of collecting all of the names and addresses of everyone who can vote.

But why do you need to register?

Well, the main reason is to prevent voter fraud. The law is that you can only vote once, and you can only vote in the area where you live.

Registering to vote creates a database that ensures that you only vote one time in the place where you live, and it makes sure you're even allowed to vote.

Really? Are some people not allowed to vote?

Oh sure! For one thing you have to be over eighteen years old. Sorry kids. Also, in the United States you have to be a citizen of the country Plus, depending on the state, if you commit a felony, a bad crime, you may not be allowed to vote at all even after you get out of prison.

Okay, so how do you register? It couldn't be easier. All you gotta do is fill out a voter registration form. They're super easy to find. You can

download them from the Internet. You can go to your local board of elections.


